SOIL CONSERVATION ACT APPEAL COMMITTEE [MEMBERS OF ASB] A person may appeal a soil conservation notice to the appeal committee appointed for the municipality in which the land is located. The ASB acts as the appeal committee.	ASB
MUNICIPAL PLANNING COMMISSION(MPC) [3 COUNCIL, 3 PUBLIC] Advises and assists Council with regards to planning and development matters; is the Development Authority and the Subdivision Authority; considers and decides on applications for subdivision, and development permits where discretionary powers are needed to implement conditions; 11-12 meetings per year on 2 nd Tuesday. 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SUBDIVISION AND DEVELOPMENT APPEAL BOARD (SDAB) [1 COUNCIL, 2 PUBLIC]

Holds meetings to hear appeals of decisions, orders or development permits of the Development or Subdivision Authority (Development Officer, MPC); meets as needed, typically less than 6 times each year. MGA requires training. (Bylaw 2022/23)

ASSESSMENT REVIEW BOARD [1 COUNCIL, 3 PUBLIC]

Part of the assessment appeal process. The three-member boards hear complaints and deliver decisions on matters relating to <u>assessment</u> (LARB = residential or farmland; CARB = all other properties and machinery/equipment). Complaints about tax amount and tax rates are not heard; 1 - 5 appeals per year; required courses are Administrative Law II and the Principles of Assessment. Training Required. (Appoint for a 3 Year term)
